

From the Rector

A Good Finish

The Olympic Games, Mexico, 1968. The marathon is the final event on the programme. The Olympic stadium is packed and there is excitement as the first athlete, an Ethiopian runner, enters the stadium. The crowd erupts as he crosses the finish line.

Way back in the field is another runner, John Stephen Akwhari of Tanzania. He has been eclipsed by the other runners. After 30 kilometres his head is throbbing, his muscles are aching and he falls to the ground. He has serious leg injuries and officials want him to retire, but he refuses. With his knee bandaged Akwhari picks himself up and hobbles the remaining 12 kilometres to the finish line. An hour after the winner has finished Akwhari enters the stadium. All but a few thousand of the crowd have gone home. Akwhari moves around the track at a painstakingly slow pace, until finally he collapses over the finish line. It is one of the most heroic efforts of Olympic history. Afterwards, asked by a reporter why he had not dropped out, Akwhari says, "My country did not send me to start the race. They sent me to finish." Source: reported on Sydney 2000 Olympics website.



Akwhari finished, he was physically and no doubt emotionally in bits, but he no doubt felt the satisfaction in knowing he had finished what he had set out to do. We know that feeling too, a good feeling. None of us feel good about ourselves when we give up on something and don't finish what we begin. Let's encourage each other to stand strong in faith, knowing that God is with us and that He wants us to go all the way to the finish line.

At Easter we celebrate the fact that our Lord Jesus went all the way to the finish line for us. Some of his final words on the cross were 'It is finished'.

What did Jesus mean when He said that? Of the seven last sayings of Christ on the cross, none is more important or more poignant than, "It is finished." Found only in the Gospel of John, the Greek word translated "it is finished" is tetelestai, is an accounting term that means "paid in full." When Jesus voiced those words, he was declaring the debt owed to His Father was wiped away completely and forever. Not that Jesus wiped away any debt that He owed to the Father; rather, Jesus eliminated the debt owed by mankind - the debt of sin. Jesus paid a debt He didn't owe because we owed a debt we couldn't pay...

Lord, the resurrection of your Son has given us new life and renewed hope. Help us to live as new people in pursuit of the Christian ideal. Grant us wisdom to know what we must do, the will to want to do it, the courage to undertake it, the perseverance to continue to do it, and the strength to finish it.

Holy Trinity Church Anniversary Year had a good finish!

What a marvellous year of celebration! Holy Trinity celebrated its 150th anniversary as a place of worship and community in Crosshaven. One hundred and fifty years ago the congregation moved down from St. Mathews Church on the hill, Templebreedy Ruin as it is fondly known today. It was heartening going back through the archives of the parish at the beginning of the year, while one hundred and fifty years is a long time for us to contemplate worship in this building our records go back to other historical church buildings and worshiping communities in Crosshaven, as far as 1615!

Over the celebratory months we had an Art Exhibition with the launch of Jennifer Gill's "A Short-Illustrated History to Celebrate the Sesquicentenary", concluding with a Celebratory Service with our own Bishop, Paul Colton, a wonderful Concert with Iarla O'Lionaird, Steve Cooney and the Crosshaven Community Choir, a Flower Festival leading into an inspiring Service of Thanksgiving. In December marking the end, the culmination of the year a "Big Sing" themed 'We lift up our Hearts in Praise'. We did just that, in thanks to God for his tremendous blessings which we have experienced throughout. Our special guest preacher at the 'Big Sing' was the Rt. Revd. Dr Kenneth Kearon Bishop of Limerick and Killaloe, who inspired us all as we look to the future in faith. According to the parish annuals Holy Trinity has had an historic connection with the Diocese of Killaloe. The first rector of this new church the Revd. M. Archdall was made bishop of Killaloe in 1897. At the centenary celebrations in 1968 the Rt Rev Stanistreet bishop of Killaloe preached keeping that link which bishop Kenneth honoured at our Big Sing Service back in December. At the centenary Jennifer Gill's father, Canon Gill was the rector of the parish and remains the longest serving rector 1949-1975 and the Bishop of Cork, Cloyne and Ross at that time was Bishop Perdue. The Big Sing was followed by a "Big Supper" in Bunnyconnellan Restaurant, Myrtleville, bringing our celebrations to a conclusion in a very fitting communion, a meal together.

At the end of a very busy year we say a huge "thank you" to everyone who made the year one to remember. To all who helped, who came along and supported the events and invited friends, from all over the dioceses. We are most grateful for the huge efforts people have gone to and we have all appreciated and benefited from the social aspects of our gatherings too.

The year is finished, but the work is not. The parish moves forward in faith continuing to pray for God's leading towards the Bicentenary!


New Arrivals!



Safeguarding Trust and Parish Panel

What's it all about?

'Safe guarding trust' is the COI Code of good practice for ministry with children. The COI has to set standards for the welfare of all children sharing in its ministry with a view to protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

Each parish is expected to implement this code and train leaders and panel members. All workers/helpers paid or voluntary are expected to know the code.

The code exists to safeguard children, young people and their leaders; it therefore has to be reasonable and practical.

Church of Ireland child protection policy statement:

It is the policy of the **Church of Ireland** to set standards for the **welfare of all children** sharing in its ministry with a view to **protecting** them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

The purpose of the code of good practice:

Thousands of children visit Church of Ireland premises for worship and for other social, educational and recreational purposes each week. The Church's ministry to them is a priority for the Church and it is only possible because of the commitment of adults who are prepared to work with children.

There is a new edition of Safeguarding Trust. This means that those who are in ministry to children and youth in the parish will need re-training, you will be made aware when the time comes. Those who were garda vetted in 2011 and before need to be re-vetted, this process has already begun. Volunteers vetted over the past year will receive training before Easter. Many thanks.
