

Easter Bunny has Near Death Experience

An eagle and rabbit have become the best of friends. Here is an unlikely Easter Bunny story from Zhengzho City, China. It was feeding time for the eagle so the owner put the Easter bunny in the big bird's cage. Amazingly, instead of following its predatory nature, the eagle befriended the rabbit. Can you put yourself in the grateful bunnies' socks?

This picture, and this story made me think about our relationship with God, a God who doesn't always do what we expect. He calls us to come close and have a meaningful relationship with him.

If we are to have a relationship with someone, we need to believe that the person exists! So, does God exist? This is the most important question we can ask, because the answer to this question determines the answers to all other questions. I believe God has revealed himself in different ways these are four of many...



- Nature reveals God to us. "When I consider your heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have ordained, what is man that you are mindful of him" (Psalm 8:3,4).
- We each have an inner guide, which we call our conscience. This is humanity's sense of right and wrong, which is similar across all cultures. All societies have a moral code, which condemns such things as stealing and murder. This inbuilt sense of right and wrong is a testimony to God's existence as our maker.
- Jesus Christ has revealed God to us. His followers, the people who spent their lives with him during his ministry recognised this. Simon Peter told Jesus: "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God". Even the devil recognised Jesus as God and obeyed him.
- The Bible is God's revelation of himself to us. The gospel story is the culmination of God's love, the proof that he has never abandoned this world.

And he is not abandoning the world now in this time of pandemic! He is closer than we can even imagine, because He IS....

"God IS. God is the one presence, the one power, the one force and source of all. There are no competitors to God, no reality existent outside of God. God is omnipotent (all powerful), omniscient (all knowing), and omnipresent (present everywhere). There is no place where God is not, simply because nothing exists without God.

In every practical decision of life, we must choose on the basis of the weight of evidence. It is the same with God. God has revealed himself in many ways, but he still gives us freedom to make our own decisions about him.

Perhaps the real question is 'have we abandoned him? The way we live our lives, for many of us who have everything we need, we think we are in control!

This Coronavirus has proved otherwise!

Is God speaking to us? Is this a wake -up call for us who take his created world for granted?

The Bible reveals a God who not only created and directs the universe, but who is Love, and who loves his creation. After reading the Word we must decide. God either matters tremendously or he doesn't matter at all. It depends on our attitude to the revelation of God in his Word.

And God revealed himself to us in Christ Jesus. The Lord Jesus came back from the dead and told his followers to share the good news with everyone that he had died for the forgiveness of the sins of the world, of which his resurrection was the proof, so that all who believed in him would live forever.

Here is the Gospel, from the lips of Peter, shortly after Pentecost, who, filled with the Holy Spirit, said: Jesus Christ of Nazareth... crucified but whom God raised from the dead... Salvation is found in no one else, for there is no other name under heaven given to mankind by which we must be saved." – Acts 4:10,12

The usual Easter greeting in church on Easter Sunday is "Christ is risen!" it reminds us that the resurrection of Christ is the basis of all community and life.

The response "He is risen, indeed!" reminds us that this is a message that needs to be contagiously and joyfully shared.

The truth is that the death and resurrection of Christ has abolished time as we know it for all those who believe. We have been translated to his glorious kingdom. We have entered into the life that proceeds from him. We have been gifted eternal life through Christ.

So now, every day is Easter-time, and we only have "today" because of the gospel story of a cross and an open tomb. And not only do we have "today," but we also have forever. And because of the gospel story, every day is a day of joy!

Pancake Morning



Safeguarding Trust and Parish Panel

What's it all about?

'Safe guarding trust' is the COI Code of good practice for ministry with children. The COI has to set standards for the welfare of all children sharing in its ministry with a view to protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

Each parish is expected to implement this code and train leaders and panel members. All workers/helpers paid or voluntary are expected to know the code.

The code exists to safeguard children, young people and their leaders; it therefore has to be reasonable and practical.

Church of Ireland child protection policy statement:

*It is the policy of the **Church of Ireland** to set standards for the **welfare of all children** sharing in its ministry with a view to **protecting** them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.*

The purpose of the code of good practice

Thousands of children visit Church of Ireland premises for worship and for other social, educational and recreational purposes each week. The Church's ministry to them is a priority for the Church and it is only possible because of the commitment of adults who are prepared to work with children.

Safeguarding Trust: the Church of Ireland Code of Good Practice for Ministry with Children is designed to protect and to enhance that ministry.

Safeguarding Trust: the Church of Ireland Code of Good Practice for Ministry with Children is designed to enable all parties within the Church of Ireland to fulfil their proper responsibilities within this ministry:



to create a safe environment which will promote healthy and fulfilling participation of children and young people in educational and recreational activities and minimise the possibility of harm, either deliberate or accidental.



to encourage safe practices for those who work with children.



to set out the appropriate responses and procedures in the event of abuse taking place.



to safeguard those who work with children from the consequences of unfounded accusations.


