Hello everybody!

Meeting Santa Claus

A Dad took his two sons, six-year-old Dennis and four-year-old Charlie, to a party where Santa was to be handing out gifts. The instructions from the organizers were to bring your own gifts, so he had



brought beach towels with the children's names printed on them.

Upon arriving, Dennis said he couldn't believe the skinny Santa was actually Santa. His doubt turned to belief when he opened his gift.

"He has to be the **real Santa!**" he said. "How else would he know my name?"

Our 'name' is important to us, we like when people know and remember our name. If someone 'knows our name' they know something about usthey know who we are'.

Names convey a sense of who we are, even our worth and that effects how we relate to others and others relate to us.

When we realise someone knows something about us, they couldn't already have known, this can even cancel our doubts, our fears and bring us to belief.

At Christmas we celebrate the coming of the Messiah, the **real Saviour** of our world. Through, the prophet Isaiah he declared to us, "*Before I was born the Lord called me; … he has spoken my name*" That demonstrates the special relationship the Messiah has to God our Father.


What is even more exciting is that this relationship extends through Jesus to us. Because of Jesus Christ, we who trust in His completed work on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins have been adopted into the family of God. I am in his family; he knows my name! "... This spurs in me a longing for God's Light, direction, wisdom and guidance to help me pray, act, find and stick to the right path. Let us join in prayer for all those in political leadership across Ireland and our world, to seek to hear and follow God's guidance in these challenging times.



What a privilege! And what a comfort to those of us who would place our faith in the **real Saviour**.

This Christmas, may you meet 'the real Saviour,' who brings gifts of comfort and joy.

We were delighted to welcome The Very Reverend Chris Peters, retired Dean of Ross to preach on our Maundy Thursday celebration. It was a wonderful service whereby we all returned home challenged



in our service to Christ. On Good Friday Nohoval church joined with the wider community in the 'Way of the Cross' at 3pm. We commenced in Nohoval Church and with Canon George Murphy and Revd. Isobel we prayed and processed to St. Patricks church at

the other end of the village where the service was concluded. We Journeyed Friday evening to the cross together in our service, reflecting on events that happened nearly 2000 years ago, half a world away, yet are still relevant to each of us. We listened for God's word in Mark's account of those twenty-four hours and used symbols and silence, experiencing the advancing darkness of that day.

Easter morning found us on the beach in Fountainstown at 7am, the rain did not take away from our celebration, or affect numbers at-



tending. Easter celebrations continued in Nohoval and then Holy Trinity Church Crosshaven. Easter eggs for the children and both churches were decorated so beautifully brought joy to many. We pray that all who attended left with hearts full of joy and sure hope in His resurrection.

Christian Aid Week

On Sunday the 15th of May we had a wonderful coffee morning and sale after our church service. Mr Andrew Coleman came along and shared with us the great work Christian Aid is doing in Zimbabwe.



As ever, very enlightening and also challenging as we have so much in comparison and the trials, we face

Rogation Sunday 22nd May 2022

Rogation means an asking of God- for a blessing on the seed and land for the year ahead. It is appropriate in any emergency, war, plague, drought or foul weather.

The practice began with the Romans, who invoked the help of the gods Terminus and Ambarvalia.

In those days a crowd moved in procession around the cornfields, singing and dancing, sacrificing animals and driving away winter with sticks. They wanted to rid the cornfields of evil.

In about the year 465 the western world was suffering from earth-quake, storm and epidemic. So, Marertius, Bishop of Vienne, aware of the popular pagan custom, ordered that prayer should be said in the ruined or neglected fields on the days leading up to ascension. With his decision, 'beating the bounds', became a Christian ceremonial.

Rogation tide arrived in England early in the 8th century and became a fixed and perennial as Christians asked for help from God at this time. On rogation tide, a little party would set out to trace the boundaries of the parish. At the head marched the Bishop or the priest with a minor official bearing a cross and after them the people of the parish, with school boys and their master trailing along, most of them held slender wands of Willow.

At certain points along the route at well-known landmarks like a bridge or style or ancient tree the cross halted, the party gathered about the priest and a litany or rogation is said, imploring God to send reasonable wealth, keep the corn and roots and boughs in good health and bring them to an ample harvest.



At our services on the 22nd of May we left the church buildings and went outside to walk, pray and sing; reflecting on water, the crops and gardens, celebrating the wonders of creation, praying for the community and at a waste bin being reminded that do we generate a

lot of waste and we are profligate in the way we consume energy; we

throw away food without thought and we create great mountains of rubbish. So, we prayed as individuals and communities to value creation, not to treat the treasure that has been entrusted to us casually or as a thing that can ever be replaced, we were challenged to make better use of the gifts God has given and to stop squandering the world's resources.

Mission to Seafarers and Seamans Christian Friend Society- Supporting Seafarers

We as a parish continue to support by providing personal gift bags containing practical items of need, like shower gel, shampoo, soap, heavy socks, warm hats, razors, boxers, snack bars, writing pads etc to merchant crew.

Life is never easy for them, and at this present time there a big need among the Ukrainian and Russian manned ships. SCFS are very grateful for our prayers and gifts, as they continue supporting and ministering to the seafarers here in Cork. Colin Jenkins of Seamen's Christian Friend Society writes,

"Thanks for the gift bags from 22 Ukrainian seafarers. Fifty percent of the crew are from Mariopol and have no homes left". Your continued generosity is much appreciated.

November and Christmas Gift Bags are being packed for Seafarers/



Merchant Ship Crew in the Port of Cork and Whitegate. This ministry is one that continues to amaze, both in the generosity of our community and the blessing that it gives to the seafarers who receive these gifts. Thank you to all who continue to contribute to this collection, which we have been doing for over two years now.

Monthly Summer Walks for Charity



Shine a light Sleep Out for Focus Ireland

Templebreedy Parish with their friends from Carrigaline Union slept out for Focus Ireland on Friday the 21st of October at Holy Trinity Church helping to build awareness,

support and raise funds for Focus Ireland. In May, homelessness fig-

ures surpassed 10,500, the highest figure recorded since before the pandemic due to a lack of affordable, secure housing in Ireland. Right now, there are 1,483 families, including 3,220 children without a home. These families can spend up to two years in a one-bedroom room in an emergency accommodation situation, which has a significant impact on mental health, self-esteem, and child development.

Sleeping out, for one night to shine a light on homelessness in Ireland is a learning experience, it puts one out of their 'cosy' zone; and one experiences the vulnerability of sleeping out in the elements, but it is well worth it to raise vital funds for Focus Ireland.

We had a great night and would like to thank those who came along, and those who donated so generously, and to the kind family who had pizzas delivered on the night!

Safeguarding Trust and Parish Panel

What's it all about?

'Safe guarding trust' is the COI Code of good practice for ministry with children. The COI has to set standards for the welfare of all children sharing in its ministry with a view to protecting them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

Each parish is expected to implement this code and train leaders and panel members. All workers/helpers paid or voluntary are expected to know the code.

The code exists to safeguard children, young people and their leaders; it therefore has to be reasonable and practical.

Church of Ireland child protection policy statement:

It is the policy of the **Church of Ireland** to set standards for the **welfare of all children** sharing in its ministry with a view to **protecting** them from physical, sexual and emotional harm.

The purpose of the code of good practice

Thousands of children visit Church of Ireland premises for worship and for other social, educational and recreational purposes each week. The Church's ministry to them is a priority for the Church and it is only possible because of the commitment of adults who are prepared to work with children.

Safeguarding Trust: the Church of Ireland Code of Good Practice for Ministry with Children is designed to protect and to enhance that ministry.

Safeguarding Trust: the Church of Ireland Code of Good Practice for Ministry with Children is designed to enable all parties within the Church of Ireland to fulfil their proper responsibilities within this ministry:



to create a safe environment which will promote healthy and fulfilling participation of children and young people in educational and recreational activities and minimise the possibility of harm, either deliberate or accidental.



to encourage safe practices for those who work with children.



to set out the appropriate responses and procedures in the event of abuse taking place.



to safeguard those who work with children from the consequences of unfounded accusations.
